

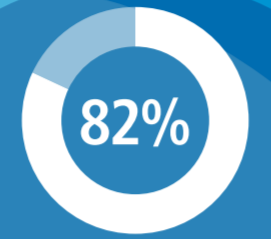
At a glance 2007–08

Key facts and figures highlighting IPPF's achievements in 2007, drawn from IPPF global indicators data.

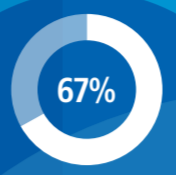
IPPF is a global service provider and a leading advocate of sexual and reproductive health and rights for all. IPPF is supported by over 30,000 staff and millions of volunteers serving their communities in a worldwide network of 152 Member Associations.



IPPF distributed nearly **126 million** condoms worldwide.



of Member Associations actively **counteracted opposition** to sexual and reproductive health and rights, including misinformation, cutting of funds, and new or existing policy or legislation that is harmful to sexual and reproductive health.

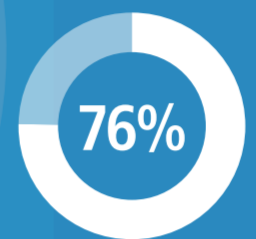


of Member Associations advocated on the issue of safe, legal abortion.

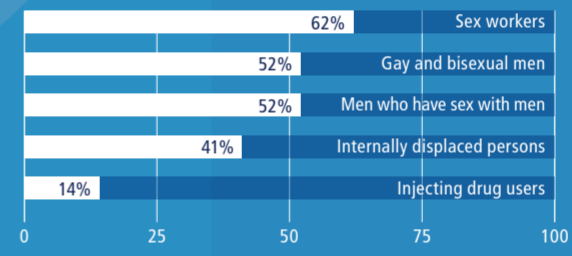


of Member Associations provided surgical or medical abortions.

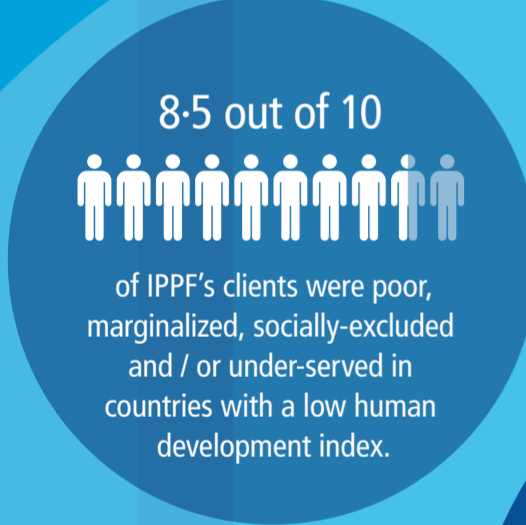
Our Member Associations provided **over 650,000** abortion-related services, of which a third were provided to women under 25.



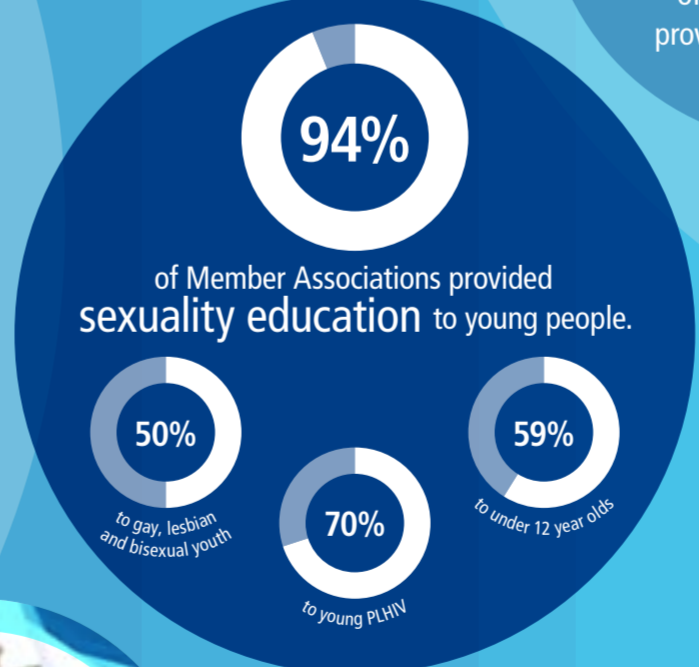
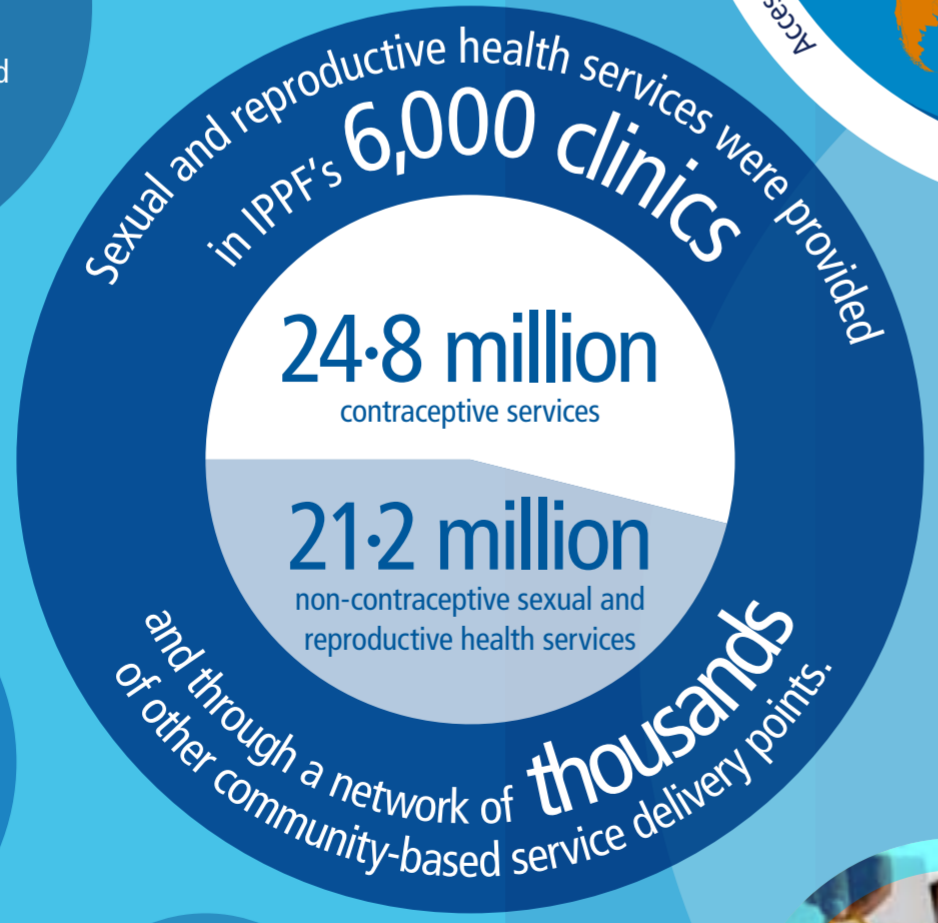
of our Member Associations have strategies to reach groups of people particularly vulnerable to HIV infection.

In collaboration with UNFPA, UNAIDS and Young Positives, we produced **20 country report cards** on HIV prevention for girls and young women, which are now being used as advocacy tools to increase awareness and support for HIV prevention initiatives.



We monitored the quality of the services we provide, and **78 per cent** of Member Associations adhered to **all our quality of care standards.**



We provided **7.6 million** couple years of protection.*

Over **15 million** sexual and reproductive health services were provided to young people.

Global advocacy

IPPF coordinated an urgent response to the removal of family planning from the World Bank's Health, Nutrition and Population Strategy. Through mobilizing its grassroots network of Member Associations, working with other civil society organizations, governments and media, we played a leading role to ensure that the Bank reinstated family planning as a priority issue in its strategy.



Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA)

During 2007, the Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) conducted grassroots organizing, direct and indirect advocacy, and coalition work at the state and federal levels to bring about positive policy change. The achievements included enacting laws to increase access to comprehensive sexuality education in four states, expanding access to emergency contraception in five states, restoring or increasing family planning funding in 15 states, expanding Medicaid family planning coverage in seven states and achieving equity in insurance coverage for contraception in one state.



Asociación Dominicana Pro-Bienestar de la Familia (PROFAMILIA)

In the **Dominican Republic**, technical personnel from the Asociación Dominicana Pro-Bienestar de la Familia (PROFAMILIA) actively participated in the development of national norms on gender-based violence. The protocols on service provision developed by the organization also served as a reference in the development of these national norms.



Asociación Pro-Bienestar de la Familia Colombiana (PROFAMILIA)

In **Colombia**, for the first time, the National Council on Health Safety included hormonal contraceptives and male condoms in the Compulsory Health Plan and the Subsidized Health Plan. The Scientific Advisor at Asociación Pro-Bienestar de la Familia Colombiana (PROFAMILIA), the IPPF Member Association in Colombia, provided direct technical assistance to the Council.



Associação Para o Planeamento da Família (APF)

Following a long period of advocating for changes in the abortion laws in **Portugal**, in February 2007, a referendum to allow all women to seek abortion services on demand until the 10th week of pregnancy, was held. Previously, abortions were only allowed in Portugal in cases of rape, a threat to the health of the mother or serious foetal abnormality. Once approved in parliament, the law will reduce unsafe abortion practices in the country.



Gambia Family Planning Association (GFPA)

The **Gambian** Member Association successfully advocated with their government for contraceptives to be included in the list of essential drugs. The act was passed in parliament in 2007, and contraceptives are now formally recognized as essential drugs for the first time in the country.

In 2007, we received **US\$120.6 million** from governments, foundations and other sources, an increase of 12 per cent from 2006.

Slovak Family Planning Association (SPR)

The **Slovak** Family Planning Association advocated against outlawing abortion, a request made by the Christian Democratic party in 2001. In 2007, the constitutional court finally ruled that it is not unconstitutional to perform abortion at a woman's request in the first trimester of pregnancy.



Health Education and Research Association (HERA)

IPPF's Member Association in **The Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia** was selected by the Ministry of Health to take an active role in the development of the National Strategy for Health and Development of Adolescents, and the National AIDS Strategy, focusing on HIV prevention among young people aged 15 to 24.



Rahnuma-Family Planning Association of Pakistan (Rahnuma FPAP)

In 2007, the Family Planning Association of **Pakistan** entered a collaborative partnership with the national health policy unit and the Ministry of Health. Following this, a chapter on reproductive health has been included in the National Health Policy for the first time.



Reproductive Health Association of Cambodia (RHAC)

A bill on the Suppression of Human Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation was debated in the Cambodian parliament in December 2007, and the law was passed in January 2008. IPPF's Member Association in **Cambodia** (RHAC), is a member of the Secretariat of a national NGO coalition which pushed for the adoption of this law.



Vanuatu Family Health Association (VFHA)

In **Vanuatu**, there was no national policy on HIV and AIDS before 2007. The Vanuatu Family Health Association (VFHA) lobbied for the introduction of a policy and was invited to participate in the drafting committee. The policy was finally launched on World AIDS Day 2007.



Sudan Family Planning Association (SFPA)

IPPF's Member Association in **Sudan** contributed to the process of developing a new law protecting people living with HIV. The law outlines the right to non-discrimination, the right to work and access to services.



Association Togolaise pour le Bien-Etre Familial (ATBEF)

The advocacy activities of the Member Association in **Togo** and other partners have resulted in a new law on sexual and reproductive health in 2007. This law includes a section on abortion which unequivocally gives the right to women in Togo to access abortion in the cases of impairment of the fetus, incest, rape, and threat to the life or health of the woman.
